What is County Lines

• County lines is a form of criminal exploitation in which criminals groom and manipulate children into drug dealing. The 'lines' refer to mobile phones that are used to control a young person who is delivering drugs, often to towns outside their home county.



County lines gangs use children and vulnerable people to courier drugs and money. A young person who is involved in county lines activity might exhibit some of these signs:




Persistently going missing from school or home, or being found out-of-area



Unexplained acquisition of money, clothes or mobile phones







Relationships with controlling, older individuals or gang association





Suspicion of self-harm, physical assault or unexplained injuries



Parental concerns




Significant decline in school performance

 Cuckooing is a practice where people take over a person's home and use the property to facilitate exploitation









Blending in
